



RULES AND REGULATIONS

- All competitions for prizes are open to the world, except when otherwise specified in the Prize List.
- Exhibits to be delivered Thursday, Sept. 18, from 7:00-9:00 p.m. and Friday, Sept. 19, 8:00 -11:00 a.m.
- No admittance to the Hall other than Judges and Directors 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Friday.
- Entries must be the property of the exhibitor for at least 30 days prior to show. All grain, roots, seeds and dairy must be the product of the exhibitor; the growth of the present year and grown on land occupied by the exhibitor.
- Only one entry may be made in each section by the same exhibitor.
- No animal or article entered for competition shall necessarily entitle the owner to a premium unless deemed worthy of a prize. All stock must be halter broken. In any dispute arising in the entry of stock, the matter will be left with the Judges to rule them out if they consider they are not entered in the proper class.
- No person shall interfere with the Judges while in the discharge of their duties under forfeiture of premium.
- The decision of the Judge(s) shall be final as to awarding of prizes and no appeal shall be considered except in cases of protest. All protests shall be made in writing and shall be delivered before 4 p.m. of the last day of the show at the Secretary's office.
- Anyone making such protest will be required to deposit the sum of \$20.00 and if said protest is not sustained, that deposit will be retained by the Society. The Board of Directors and the acting Convenor of the involved section shall constitute a committee to determine protests.
- No articles shall be removed from the hall until 3:30 p.m. on the final day of the fair, or leave is given by the President. Any exhibits in Homecraft section left after 5:00 p.m. become property of the Society.
- While every reasonable protection is given to ensure safety of articles, it must be understood that the owners assume the risk of exhibition, and should an article be lost, injured, or stolen, the Directors will render all the assistance in their power for the recovery of the same, but will not make any payment for loss.
- It shall be a condition of entry that the Society shall not be liable for any loss to an exhibitor affected by fire, accident, condition of structure, the negligence of other exhibitor, officials or otherwise.
- Persons who gain admission to the grounds other than by the gate will be ejected. No vendor shall enter the grounds until they have paid their fee and received permission from the officers of the Society.

- The Treasurer will pay prizes by November 1, 2025. Prizes should be cashed by December 15, 2025. All prize money not demanded before January 1, 2026 will be forfeited to the Society. The Society will not hold itself responsible for any printer or other obvious errors in the prize list.
- Children 17 years and under may exhibit without paying an exhibitor's fee in Junior Classes only.
- In case of bad or unfavourable weather or other reasons causing the receipts to fall short of paying expenses and all prizes in full, after paying expenses, a proportionate amount will be deducted from such prizes to enable the Directors to balance the accounts without loss. The directors feel this is the most equitable and fair course that can be adopted, and any deduction will fall proportionately on all, and not leave the whole sum to be a debt or bear heavily on the Society and impair its usefulness.
- The prize list is available on the website www.grandvalleyfair.ca or at the Grand Valley Library. Each exhibitor will be furnished with a number by the Secretary gvagsociety@live.com or call (226) 979-3724. All entries will be made by this number and with the number of the class and section entered on the ticket. Tickets for exhibits are available from the Secretary or Library.
- We are using AssistExpo to manage entries to our fair. To enter online, you simply go to https://www.assistexpo.ca/grand-valley-agricultural-society and create an AssistExpo account if you don't already have one. Once your account is created, you will be able to add your entries. If you need guidance, look for the HELP button. You'll see, it's easy!



- **a.** Local fair is entitled to send only the Grand Champion Quilt, (min. **324**" measured on the perimeter) judged the best of show of all hand quilted quilts to the District Competition. **OR** If any entry wins Grand Champion Or Best of all Eligible Quilts at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter their Reserve Champion or Second Best of Show of all Classes quilt in the District Competition.
- **b. NOTE:** If an Exhibitor wins Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible quilts at other than his/her own fair, or at more than one Fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District meeting.
- **c.** An Exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different quilt at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District Competition.
- d. Local Homecraft Divisions judge a Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible quilts. As well as Reserve Grand Champion or Second Best of Show of all eligible quilts. The Grand Champion and the Reserve Grand Champion are judged from all first and second prize eligible quilts.
